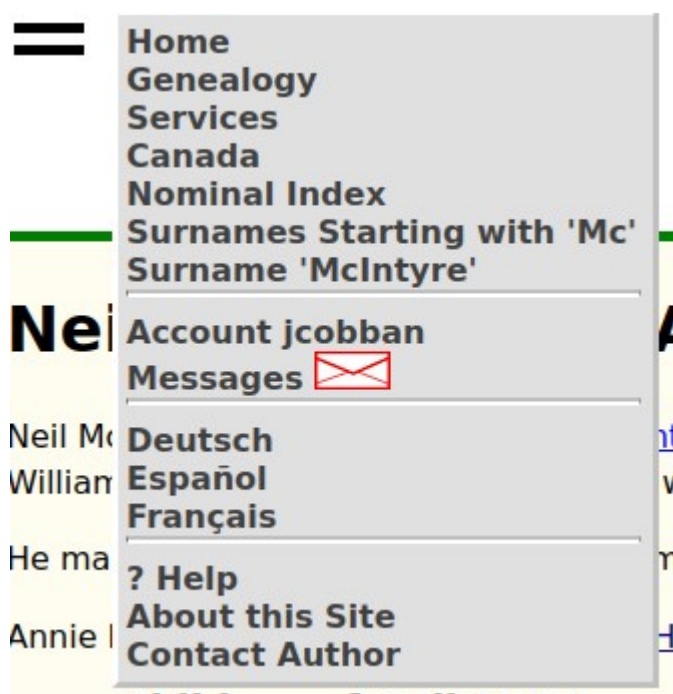
My style of research is to pick a set of documents, say a page of a census or a block of vital records, and try to find matches in the family tree. One of my current ongoing projects is transcribing and linking the [register of the employees of the Ontario Psychiatric Hospital at London](#) from its founding until 1922.

Technical Improvements

For most of the past couple of years I have been focused on fixing fundamental design issues. One issue is what is called XSS exploitations. [Cross-Site Scripting \(XSS\)](#) attacks are a type of injection, in which malicious scripts are injected into otherwise benign and trusted websites. They trick the website into executing run-time scripts, written in [ECMAScript](#) (also known as JavaScript or on Microsoft® Windows© as Jscript).

Furthermore I have upgraded the site to exploit the capabilities of [ECMAScript 2015](#), also known as JavaScript version 6. All web browsers, **except Microsoft Internet Explorer**, support ES2015 and it provides both improved support for Enterprise design and incorporates common functionality which in previous versions of ECMAScript you had to install 3rd party products, such as JQuery, to obtain. For my development it is particularly useful because it provides program validation tools which have permitted me to identify a number of subtle bugs. If you are still running Internet Explorer some functionality of the site will not work, so you are encouraged to upgrade to Microsoft Edge, Google Chrome, Mozilla Firefox, or **any** other browser.

My site is multilingual. Every page in the site is available both in English and French, and the most popular pages are available in Spanish and German as well. If you click on the main menu (hamburger) button at the top left of every page you will see the menu of services.



This contains the hierarchy of pages above the current page, access to your account and messages, a list of other languages the page is available in, and links to help. All applications within the site have now been updated to support this capability

As with any public site remember to change your password periodically. You can do this through the Account option.

New Functionality

The implementation of the account registration page has been made more user friendly:

Since both the user name and the electronic mail address are unique identifiers of an account and since users are more likely to remember their e-mail address than their user name for this one web-site the form has been rearranged. Furthermore those casual visitors who filled in the form requesting further

information or who explicitly sent a message to the page author do not know what the user name assigned to the account is. So regardless of whether you have previously registered or how you registered you can simply enter your e-mail address into the form and press Enter. This will locate your account if you have one. The form suggests a user name if you do not have an existing account, but you can change this to anything you prefer. You can then enter a new password, or generate a random very strong password. If you choose to enter a password yourself you are given a rating which changes as you add to the password.

It is advantageous to register as you can:

1. change the user name of the account
2. contribute to the transcriptions of original source documents
3. update the family tree
4. opt out of receiving monthly e-mails
5. turn off the popups that appear to explain how individual input fields and buttons are used, which will become tedious once you have familiarized yourself with the site
6. choose a default language for communications

When editing a member of the Family Tree, you can now explicitly define and edit alternate names for the person.
